#### **RATES INFORMATION**

#### **Rates**

Rates revenue is used to provide a range of services such as road rehabilitation, footpath repairs and maintenance, storm water drainage, ongoing maintenance of parks, gardens and buildings, street lighting and street cleaning, libraries, animal control, planning and enforcement of local laws.

Whilst a Waste Collection Charge will still fall under rate revenue, a separate charge will be raised for the collection of waste. Amounts collected under this charge can only be raised at the estimated costs associated with the waste collection and disposal.

#### **Valuation**

The Council has decided to continue to use Capital Valuation as the basis for valuing land within the Council area. The Council considers that this method of valuing land provides the fairest method of distributing the rate burden across all ratepayers.

### **Minimum Rate**

For 2022/23 Council has set a minimum amount payable by the way of general rates of \$860.

### Regional Landscape (RL) Levy

The RL Levy is a State Government levy which Council is required to collect on behalf of the State Government. The Levy is based on the capital value of your property and is shown as a separate charge on your Rate Notice.

### **Mannum Waters Separate Rate**

Sect 154 of the Local Govt Act 1999 enables Council to declare a Separate Rate on rateable land. Council is required under the Landscape SA Act 2019 to cover the evaporation loss of 187mL within the Mannum Waters Marina. The separate rate will be raised over 15 years to recover the cost of purchasing 187mL of permanent water entitlements and associated financial costs. Council has contributed 21% of the total cost.

### **Service Charge**

Council provides various prescribed services. Service charges are levied in accordance with Sect 155 of the the Local Govt Act 1999.

## Bowhill Multi Access TT & Water Supply

- Bowhill Multi Access Television System \$146 per property serviced
- Bowhill Water Supply System \$256 per property serviced, annual consumption of up to 120 kilolitres of water plus an excess water charge of 75 cents per kilolitre.

# Community Wastewater Management System (CWMS)

The annual CWMS charge based on the balance of accumulated funds (surplus/deficit) of each scheme along with the projected annual expenditure. Refer to the Annual Business Plan for a full list of the 28 CWMS annual service charges.

### **General Waste & Kerbside Recycling Collection**

- 1 bin service General Waste \$200
- 2 bin service General Waste, & Recycling \$286

#### **Rebates**

Council provides both mandatory and discretionary rebates pursuant to the Act. Council may grant a rebate of rates, up to 100% to eligible ratepayers.

### Hardship

Ratepayers experiencing financial hardship may seek confidential assistance from Council's rates team.

### **Postponement of Rates**

Ratepayers who hold a State Seniors card are able to apply to Council to postpone payment of rates in excess of \$500 on their principal place of residence.

### **Rate Capping**

A Rate Cap of 15% is to apply to eligible residential ratepayers' principal place of residence to protect individuals against increased rates brought by the second year of phasing in the rating change that included the introduction of the Waste Management Charge. By application, a cap of 15% will apply to the combined amount of General Rates and Waste Management Service Charge. Primary production ratepayers are not eligible due to having a differential rate that is 10% less than all other land use categories. Conditions apply. Applications close 17 March 2023.

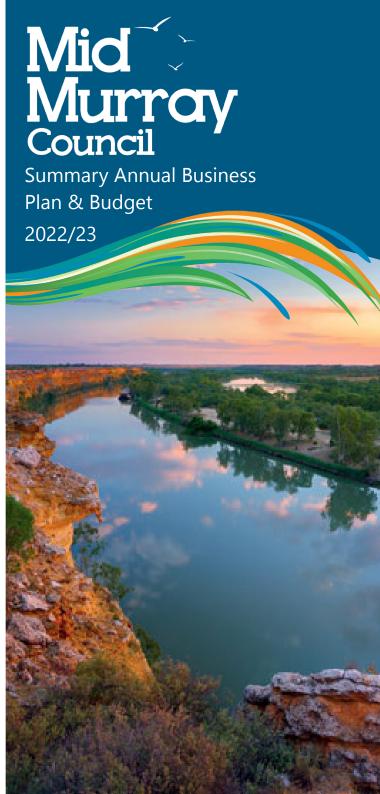

### What services are provided by council?

- Progression of the Wongulla CWMS project;

- Completion of PS Canally restoration project and the Mannum Murray River Heritage Tourism project;
